A training conference for all clinicians, Asian and non-Asian:

This one-day training conference offers mental health professionals and students/trainees, consumers and their family members an opportunity to acquire knowledge and skills in coping with anger and violence in different settings. As a result of this training, participants will be better able to communicate with and treat Asian American consumers who are confronted with such issues in personal life, family relationships and school-settings. Through the workshop presentations, participants will learn to apply culturally appropriate strategies to help their Asian American clients deal with anger and violence in their daily life. No pre-requisite is required. Each participant requesting CME/CE credits is required to fill out a program evaluation form.

The educational objectives are to:

- 1. Learn culturally appropriate ways to assess and treat patients who have anger issues in everyday life.
- 2. Identify challenges and apply specific strategies to help improve functioning and build connections/flexibility in Asian American families.
- 3. Address issues pertaining to consequences of violence in school-settings.

Turn LEFT onto SOUTH ALMANSOR STREET (0.2 miles).


From the 10 Freeway, going WEST:


Take the GARFIELD AVENUE exit- EXIT 23B- toward ALHAMBRA (0.1 miles).

Plenary Speakers

MORNING SPEAKER

Christopher K. Chung M.D. is a graduate of the College of Medicine, Seoul National University in Korea. He received his psychiatric internship training at the State University of New York at Buffalo and completed his psychiatric residency at Washington University in St. Louis. He has spent much of his career working in the public sector with psychiatric populations demonstrating a very high acuity of illness. Some of the places he has worked include: "EMPATH" (psychiatric emergency service, in New York State), Malcolm Bliss Hospital in St. Louis, The Dangerous Patient Unit at Ft. Logan Mental Health Center, Denver, Colorado, and the Psychiatric Emergency Service at Harbor UCLA Medical Center. Dr. Chung is currently the Medical Director for the LA County Department of Mental Health Full Service Partnership/Field Capable Clinical Services program at Harbor UCLA Medical Center and is a Clinical Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Biobehavioral Sciences at the Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA. Dr. Chung has studied anger and its manifestations from a cross cultural perspective, including the syndrome of hwabyung (Anger disease.) He has presented papers on this topic at national and international conferences. In his book "Korean Portrait" (in Korean), he writes about the conceptualization and manifestations of repressed anger and chronic accumulated anger (Hahn and Jeong).

AFTERNOON SPEAKER

Jeffrey R. Cugno is a Special Agent and Primary National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime (NCAVC) Coordinator with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The mission of the NCAVC is to provide Criminal Investigative Analysis of violent, sexual and serial crimes as a resource available to law enforcement agencies worldwide. He joined the FBI in 2000 in the Los Angeles Field Office's Cyber Crime Squad and also was a Team Leader for the Evidence Response Team (ERT). As a Cyber Investigator, Special Agent Cugno was responsible for the investigation of threatening communications, child pornography, computer intrusions, and Internet fraud. As the Primary NCAVC Coordinator, he has been the FBI Los Angeles Field Office's NCAVC program manager, violent crime assessor, and administrator. Prior to becoming a Special Agent, he was employed as an FBI Computer Specialist in the Los Angeles Field Office. He also is a Behavioral Assessor on the FBI Crisis Negotiation Team (CNT). Recently, SA Cugno was selected to the FBI's Child Abduction Rapid Deployment (CARD) Team which generally deploys in response to non-family child abductions. SA Cugno is a Certified Police Instructor who has provided training to over 4,000 domestic and international participants on a variety of topics. He holds a Master of Science Degree in Justice, Law and Society and is a member of the Association of Threat Assessment Professionals, the American Society for Industrial Security International, the California Homicide Investigators' Association, and the California Association of Hostage Negotiators.
